

On the Cutting Edge

The average household has five pairs of scissors. Scissors have bent handles and curved handles, and come with bent tips, flat tips, sharp tips and curved tips. The blades can be 2", 3", 4", 5", 6", 7" or longer, or serrated. Scissors come in different styles, such as dressmaker, embroidery, lace, weavers, buttonhole, applique, and those specially designed for "lefties."

Keep you dressmaking scissors strictly for use with fabric. Invest in a pair of scissors for paper and a pair to use in the kitchen. This will help keep your sewing scissors for that purpose.

Check These Recycling Tips for Sewing

✓ Get those chopsticks out of the drawer that you salvaged from the time you went to the Chinese Restaurant and put them into the pencil sharpener. They make the best stiletto. If you hit one with your needle, you just have to resharpen.

✓ When putting a quilt together, hang up that old flannel backed plastic tablecloth. Cotton pieces and blocks magically stick to it without any pins!

✓ Old cloth eyeglass cases make the best and safest rotary cutter cases.

√ Take shoulder pads that you were going to toss, fold and stitch the curved side. You have a picket for small scissors, seam gauge and the outside is perfect for pins. Works great for embroidery or bedside your chair for mending.

✓ When you're hand sewing, it's always easy to lose your needles. Try using a votive candle, it makes a wonderful pincushion. You can keep 6-8 needles in it. A great bonus, the wax left on the needles makes it easier to go in and out of fabric.

Bay Fog -- a complex neutral that evokes impressions of gray, blue and purple.

Chakra Purple -- a veiled, mystical lavender, red-based and midtone.

Hermatite -- a deep, dark gray purple that is a replacement for black.

Meritage -- a complex browninfluenced purple.


Salsa Lito -- this browned red is strong and opulent.
