### It's Time to Organize Your Holiday Sewing

If you're like me, each year you plan to make several special holiday gifts. In fact, I spend a lot of time planning elaborate embellishments with multiple gifts from the same pattern in a variety of fabrics and colors -- well, you get the idea. Lots of plans. Only to abandon them in favor of a trip to the mall at the last minute for ready-made items. Which, of course, means spending mega bucks, because I already bought everything I need to make the gifts at home. Sound



familiar? Here are a few suggestions to avoid last-minute stress, panic and guilt:

- 1) Organize your holiday sewing NOW. I set aside a large empty box and label it "Holiday Sewing," make a gift list and collect books and patterns. Add pieces of fabric from your stash and any trims you have on hand. Put individual projects in plastic bags and store everything in the box. You won't waste time chasing down individual items later.
- 2) Use the KISS principle--KEEP IT SEW SIMPLE! A simple, handsome gift created by you will be received with as much enthusiasm as an elaborate, hard-to-sew gift requiring hours and hours to complete. Check out the list of suggested books at the end of this article for simple, easy-to-sew gifts. (I save the elaborate gifts for birthdays and special anniversaries.)
- 3)Choose one or two items and make them up several times assembly-line style. You'll save time and money. This year, I'm making two styles of tote bags.
- 4)Consider using leftover scraps to make a coordinating
  "something extra." For example, make a checkbook cover from
  scraps left from making a tote bag. You have a unique combination that
  can't be bought at the store for any price.
- 5)Customize patterns to suit your list. For my tote bag project, I will choose fabrics that reflect the personalities and life-styles of my family and friends--a horse tapestry for my "horsey" niece, a chic Ultrasuede for my uptown sister, and a teddy bear print for a friend's daughter. I'll add pockets and trims to fit individual needs. These variations on a basic theme make for more interesting sewing, too.
- 6) Get together and "Holiday Sew" with friends. You'll have fun and get some serious sewing done at the same time. Have hubby wrangle the kids and get dinner. Tell him how much money you're saving by making it yourself.
- 7) Make six or seven variations of one or two small items and put them away for last minute hostess gifts, teacher gifts and token gifts for friends. I wrap them, put them in a bag marked "You're Sew Special" and place it in my holiday sewing box. Instead of running to the mall at the last minute, I reach into the bag. This year, I'll make a special ornament and a few small items from Mary Mulari's Travel Gear and Gifts to Make.
- 8) Set realistic goals and stick to them. Plan now so you'll have the majority of your holiday sewing done in time for you to enjoy the season and not go crazy sewing at the last minute. I remember tucking a note in as I wrapped a not-quite finished gift at midnight on Christmas Eve. "To be finished by Santa's Elves after the Christmas Rush." That won't happen this year, because I'm organized and ready to sew!

#### You will need:

4 1/2 c. raw pumpkin seeds

2 T. cooking oil

1 tsp. salt clear sandwich bags

Rinse pulp and strings from seeds. Drain. Mix seeds, oil & salt in a bowl.

Spread on a cookie sheet lined with waxed paper. Let stand for 24-48 hours or until dry. Stir once in a while. Remove waxed paper and toast seeds in the oven for 40 minutes at 325°. Stir once or twice. Drain seeds on a paper towel. Store in plastic bags for a great treat!

## A Place to Sew


Our regular October meeting on Tuesday, October 5, will be held at California Closets, 650 N. Carriage Parkway. They will be presenting a program on "Organizing Your Sewing Room."




Remember the following tips no matter how much space you have in your sewing room:

- The most efficient sewing arrangement is the U-shaped design which also uses the least floor space.
- Since cutting is done standing up, the cutting table should be 36 inches high.
- Sewing on a table can lead to strained back muscles, so a better height for an adult is 28 inches -- the height of a typing table or computer table.
- The surface you use to cut out items should be at least a 30 X 36 inch surface (36 X 72 inches is better).
- Adjust your ironing board to a seated height (24 inches for an adult) and place it to the left of your sewing machine to complete the right-to-left flow of work.
- Sewing requires twice as much light as casual reading.
- Smooth floor coverings are recommended for sewing areas. If you have carpet, try putting an office desk mat under your chair. It will make picking up pins, needles and beads much easier.
- Pegboard can hold scissors, rolling cutters, rulers, etc. when placed on the wall behind the sewing machine.
- Metal chests with labeled shallow drawers, originally intended for shop use, can be used to store attachments, thread, zippers, seam tape, and other small notions.
- Use a sturdy wooden skirt hanger to hold your cutting mat. This way it can hang behind a door or in a closet, and it will not get bent on curled.
- Thread racks are great and can be extended by adding drinking straws to the regular wooden spool holders.
   Dust can become a problem with thread stored in the open.

California Closets is located in northeast Wichita (See map at right.) near the Pennypower Shopping News offices.

## Creative Serging from Palmer/Pletsch

This video features nice close-ups of various types of decorative threads so you can get ideas for what kind of thread you want for the desired effect. Marta Alto's explanation of which tension to change seemed very informative to me. It's almost like a sampler as she goes through various threads and effects. My favorite look was the blanket stitch for the edge of jackets, but there were several simple designs that were enhanced by the various styles of thread and stitches used. The other idea I really liked was putting the facing on the outside that had been decoratively serged and stitching in the ditch to attach it to the garment.

She also shows how to couch threads and apply beads. Marta also used a flatlock stitch to create a colorful finished edge on the inside of the jacket facings and as a finish on lingerie.
