In the past, I have made chemo caps and now I have worn them to cover my own cold and balding head. Here are a few tips:

- Loose and soft is great. Err on the large side. That newly uncovered skin is very tender! I find myself wearing the chemo caps as if they are baker's caps, with empty air above my head.
- You can adjust your pattern for the fabric. It's the same whether you have an extra stretchy fabric, or a not-so-stretchy one. Try it out. Pick up the fabric holding a "stretch wise" fold and put it up to your head. Find out where a comfortable, gentle fit around your head would be. Use that for the circumference.
- Fabrics of varying weights are good.

Please know that is really is comforting to have hats available at the places where the chemo is administered. I think it makes a difference.





I want to applaud you for doing such great things. There was an amazing amount of work and time that went into the donations you brought. We had 528 ½ hours of work donated. When I got home to inventory and sort the items here is what I found:

- 3 Sacks of shampoo, lotion, bubble bath, tooth brushes, etc.
- 4 Table toppers
- 4 Bags for children with toys
- Bag with cleaning supplies
- Bag with baby supplies
- Bag with apron & towels
- Bag with pillow, pillowcase & blanket
- Bag with pillow and quilt
- Bag with bath towel, socks and misc. items
- Bag with towels and bath items

My living room looked like a retail store while I was sorting and counting.

Margie Marks and I delivered the items on Friday. We took two of the smaller blankets and 12 of the pillowcases to the VA Hospital along with some of the backpacks. The rest of the quilts and pillowcases went to Victory in the Valley. The rest of the items went to Harbor House. I took a letter to each of the places with a little bit of information about our group. They were all very

appreciative for what they received. Harbor House wanted us to know that it is so nice for the people there to receive something brand new and that is all theirs.

The right embellishment can make any sewing project go from mundane to marvelous! And the best part is, you can create exquisite embellishments using a very basic zigzag-capable sewing machine. Appliqué, reverse appliqué, "windows," shrink thread, 2 different "Un-Beweavable" techniques, cool button stacking combos and couching–we'll experiment with all of them.

<u>Participants should bring:</u> Sewing machine, all accessories and feet, instruction manual, 2 spools beige thread, 2 bobbins, extra spool pin, extra machine needles (size 80/12 or 90/14), basic sewing supplies. Kit fee: \$23 (to be paid to Gail Yellen at the workshop)

What is Cosmetic Serger-y? It's the blending of construction and decorative serger techniques. While the serger is traditionally used for finishing edges, it can also be an important embellishment tool. Whether you're a new serger owner or have been using one for years, you'll learn some very cool techniques that will add a whole new dimension to your garment, home décor or quilt projects. We'll explore the wide variety of decorative threads to create decorative stitches and take your artistry to a whole new level. Create braid trim and embellished elastic button loops with your serger. Leave with a workbook loaded with valuable information, samples and the inspiration to tackle any decorative serger technique successfully. Participants must be familiar with threading and changing needles on their machine.
