Get To Know Marilyn John

My first memory of sewing came when I was about 5. My mother had bought a very expensive sewing machine called a Necchi. It could do everything. It had all sorts of attachments and was one of the first zigzag machines on the market. She paid \$400 for it. This was the late 40's. She had to have made payments on it, this was a lot of money back then.

I took sewing in the 9th grade, but did not start sewing for myself until high school. I had a good friend who made most of her clothes and she taught me to flat line everything. My first attempt was a blue gingham sleeveless sheath dress. The one thing she did not teach me was the necessity of clipping the armhole seam allowance. After some adjustments, it looked great. I bought my own sewing machine when I moved in with two roommates who both sewed. Two of us worked at the GEM store, which had a great selection of fabric. Many times 3 yards for a dollar.

My next exposure was when I was at Channel 12. We had a LIVE program five days a week called The Joyce Livingston Show. This was some of the most fun I ever had. She had various guests, many that had to do with sewing. We had a McCall's (pattern) trunk show come and be a guest on the show. These were the actual garments that would show up in the pattern books. Joyce had five boys and did a lot of sewing for them including free motion embroidery on their tee shirts.

In 1973 I purchased a Pfaff 1212 the most wonderful sewing machine I ever had. I wished I had never gotten rid of it. With this new machine, I could make a lot of things. My husband was not a demanding man, but asked me to make a dinner jacket. It was red single layer polyester [like the band uniforms] with black trim. I learned about hair canvas, sleeve heads, padding and other stuff. It turned out exactly like the muslin I made. I did not realize that I needed two more inches for the sleeve hem. It was gorgeous, but the sleeves were short. I have never again made a man's jacket.

Over the years, I have made many swimsuits for my family. I joined ASG in 2000, two years after my mom died. I wish I had known about it earlier, she would have loved it. I have really enjoyed it.

Get To Know Janeen Miller

I was born in Wichita, KS and grew up on the west side. I attended Wichita High School West and graduated in 1966. While in high school I took several business classes and decided that was the path I wanted to take for my life career thinking that I would become a business teacher. By the time I graduated, that thought had become a thing of the past, but I still wanted to be involved in business. I decided to attend Wichita Business College and graduated with an Executive Secretarial degree in the spring of 1967.

I was fortunate enough to be hired at Beech Aircraft in 1968 in a Division that I really enjoyed. I was there until 1973 (with a 6 mo lay off) when I decided that I should stay home with my 2 babies. I have 2 sons – Justin (born and adopted 12/72) and Jason (born 8/73). No this isn't a typo. Boys actually lack 8 days of being 8 months apart in age. They have blessed us with 4 grandchildren.

In 1976 I was asked if I was interested in going back to work at Beech. It was something I was interested in so I accepted. I ended up working for the same individual for 16 years.

I met my current husband, Jim, through friends at Beech. We married on May 13, 1988 (and it was on Friday) and just celebrated our 36th anniversary. Jim has one daughter, Carol, who travels the world for her job working for a Child Advocacy group. During her last time living in Ethiopia, she adopted 3 children.

I left Beech/Raytheon in 2001 due to all the changes within the company.

My mother gave me 2 quilts in 1980 that my great grandmother had made. I was in awe. I finally made my first quilted project in 1992 when a friend talked me into taking a class. I fell in love with it. After I left Beech I wanted to open my own business and it wasn't long until Sunflower Quilts was a reality. Jim had retired from Beech by then also and was a major part of the shop. We added sewing machines to our inventory soon after so w.e were an all you needed quilt shop. I specifically enjoyed teaching the different stitches that could be used on the machines, By 2014 we were ready to retire and enjoy kids and grandkids. Travel as we could.

I continue to learn different ways to use the speciality stitches and really enjoy the embroidery part. I know my grandmother would be in envy of the machines on the market now.

I joined ASG in 2018 and have enjoyed all the opportunities presented as well as the friendships have developed.

Get To Know Nancy Boewe (bay-wee)

My early sewing days started when I was about 9. Gee, that is 70 years ago already. My mother taught me how to make very simple doll clothes. Of course it was hand sewing, too young for the machine...

By the sixth grade I made a skirt for a Girl Scout project. I took every sewing class, including tailoring classes offered from 7th grade through my senior year. Made my prom dresses, a wool suit and most of my clothes. We had fun sewing and great teachers. I learned to mix purchased clothing from my favorite stores with items I made. Helped to stretch the wardrobe money. Back in the day, I would buy fabric on Monday and make an outfit for Friday night.

Have always done mostly fashion sewing. Never liked handwork, did a little craft sewing but always went back to clothing. Made a deal with my mother, I put in zippers for her, and she did my hems.

I have been a member of Wichita ASG since 2009. Over the years in ASG I have enjoyed organizing the "Eat and Shops". We started them in 2012 and did about 40 before we stopped in 2016. They are coming back.

Spent my early working days as a Certified Dental Assistant working in offices and then teaching for about 3 years. Also, a Registered Medical Assistant. Did a short stint with Braniff Airlines in the heyday of working for an airline. I am retired from Boeing after 23 years (2002),

I have had a great life and blessed with many friends. Many I have known since school days

Single, never married and very independent. With one spoiled standard Poodle Skye. Also, have one of the best brothers ever Bob. We grew up in the same grades, so everyone thought we were twins, we are one year apart.

This is 9th grade sewing class at Curtis Jr. High. We made corduroy gored skirts. The main lesson was to keep the nap of the fabric, all going the same direction.
